18 October : Les Molloy – Japan's natural World Heritage: part 2: the Ogasawara Islands and the Ryukyu Island chain

Les Molloy made about 10 visits to wild natural areas in Japan over the 25-year period from 1993 to 2018. Most of these trips were to evaluate Japan's nominations for natural World Heritage, or to advise the Japanese authorities on suitable WH candidates.

This second talk on his travels spans visits from 2006 to 2018 and will deal with the remote islands in the Ogasawara (Bonin) Islands chain, and the Ryukyu Islands (including Okinawa) which extend SE from mainland Japan almost to Taiwan. In addition to their outstanding natural values, both island chains were the sites of bloody battles in the Pacific in the latter stages of WWII – especially Iwo Jima and Okinawa..

25 October : John, Ian & Merryl - Remembering Doug

Up until his death in March 2020 Doug Flux was an active HVTC member – involved in climbing, caving, tramping, cycling, kayaking and river activities. Join John, Merryl and Ian for an evening celebrating Dougs' life through his own photographs – adventures within NZ and overseas....



CENTENARY SCHOOL FUND UPDATE

HVTC has awarded three Hutt Valley secondary schools grants from the HVTC centenary school fund.

Wainuiomata High School, Taita College and Hutt Valley High School all received \$1,616 each.

We achieved a total of \$4,850 for the fund, including generous donations from club members and a \$2,000 contribution from HVTC funds.

The grants will be used for:

Wainuiomata High School

- Packs and tarpaulins to lend/use for camping and tramping trips
- Adrenaline forest activity as part of a student leadership course

Taita College

- Tramping clothing and equipment to loan to students for camping, tramping, mountain biking and rafting trips
- Year 10 trip in October 2023 to Waiohine Gorge for rafting and abseiling

Hutt Valley High School

 Tents, stoves and other equipment for camps for year 9 students and senior PE and geography students

Club members also donated a large range of secondhand tramping clothing and equipment for Wainuiomata High School and Taita College.

All schools expressed their gratitude for the club's support for their students so they can more easily take part in outdoor recreation.

The teachers said they have students who can't afford to take part in tramping, camping and other outdoor activities. Some students don't join activities because they are embarrassed at not having the right clothing or equipment because their family budgets are too tight.

In HVTC's centenary year, I am proud to have shown our club's community leadership and spirit of service to the Hutt Valley.

We'll keep you updated as the schools report back on how they have spent their grants.

On behalf of the General Committee and the centenary school fund sub-committee (myself, Emma Dobbie, Kate Brownsword and Dennis Page), thank you very much for your donated funds and tramping gear to support a new generation of outdoor lovers.

Extra congratulations to each of these photographers! These images (except for two that had been made earlier than the FMC Competition Rules allowed) have been submitted to the FMC 2023 Photographic Competition, the results of which will be published in the November edition of Backcountry2023 – look out for that!

A personal observation: We are, as trampers, climbers, skiers and/or bikers, susceptible to just capturing snap-shot images during our journeys. That's completely understandable – but careful cropping and exposure adjustments are useful tools for highlighting the core of these images. Please do not be afraid to use these simple techniques to generate images with greater impact. However, to create really spectacular images we photographers need to be awake to unusual opportunities – of subject and lighting – and then use the arts of composition – there are a few straightforward rules – to convey a 3-dimensional character on a 2-dimensional medium; to generate a sense of action and motion in an image that is of an instant in time; to capture the emotions of the participants in the scene. Geoff highlighted these ideas and introduced the technical "tricks" in his commentary!

Carolyn Lyon – organised the prizes and engraving of the trophies; Murray Presland – organised the presentation of the images, and was responsible for a few errors in managing them!

HVTC- THE MARRIAGE CLUB??!!

When I joined the Club in 1956 the majority of members were in their late teens into twenties with a sprinkling of "Oldies". Well attended mixed trips, unlike pre WW2 when some Clubs had Chaperones (EG May Vosseler TTC), these were more enlightened days! However, after a day

hot/sweaty or cold/wet/muddy – without deodorants etc – arriving at a Tararua Hut with a typical "Maori Bunk" sleeping shelf it was hard to become amorous – especially if crowded with sleeping bags top & tailed entwined!! But hormones overcame!!

Later, I borrowed the bound copies of H&V newsletters to search for trips I may have been on. The zealous Editors had also noted the engagements of members, plus often the weddings. From October 1957 until October 1968 listed are 63 couples! In the 3 years I was overseas from April 1959 until January 1962 there were 22 weddings. This included our Anne Cooke who married Roger Coventry of TTC. She was told (jokingly!) "You must not marry outside our Club!!". She was not the only one.

In June 1967 the Editor (Jan Heine) recorded: WHAT EVER NEXT... Another stalwart has bit the dust. After clearing so many hurdles Stevens has finally tripped but he seems capable of continuing with the help of a pacer – Helen McKenzie of Silverstream. Congratulations Alan".

An interesting aside: In the mid 1960s after a NZ Census it reported a large number of single women and also a large number of single males. Typically, the "NZ Womens Weekly" engaged some high profile Ladies to discover how this could be addressed. They ultimately published their conclusions which finished with:" If all else fails, join a tramping club"!! This article was pinned up on the Club noticeboard which resulted in a series of male only trips. This didn't last for long and may even have spawned the famous Chooks Trips??!!

In the South Island mountains

As many of you will know, both my parents, both long-time HVTC members, passed away in recent years. Mum was 82 when she died and Dad was 91. The Hutt Valley Tramping Club was such an important part of their lives for over 60 years; Dad was a member for almost 65 years. I have been wanting to acknowledge this in the Hills and Valleys for some time. Now, with the club's 100th anniversary year upon us, providing extra reason to go through the old photos, I feel in a better position to do this, because the photos help fill in their

The HVTC gave my parents, like all of us, the opportunity to join with others who were/are also drawn to the hills. There was great camaraderie, supporting and learning from each other while out there in the back country, sharing billy tea and communal sing-a-longs, dances, good times and challenging times. And there was that mutual deep appreciation of the places travelled.

Thank you HVTC members, past and present, for all the companionship over the years, and the love and support you showed our family around the very sad and challenging times when they passed away.

The beginnings

Margaret

Mum (Margaret) grew up on her family farm out at Waimarama, Hawke's Bay. She spent a lot of her childhood and teenage years away at boarding schools in Havelock North. But home was the farm, which was especially isolated back then in the 1930s–1940s, because of the slower motorcars and dirt roads, and primitive telecommunications. She loved her cat Tibs, and riding her horse on the hilly country, and along the wide surf beach looking out to Motu-o-Kura/Bare Island. Leaving college early, after the upset of the sudden death of her father, she made tracks southward, to city life in Wellington, where she worked as a dental assistant at Wellington Hospital.

Graeme

Dad (Graeme) was from the other end of the country. Born in Dunedin on Anzac Day1930, his father was a school inspector and his mother a school teacher. The family had a few years in Auckland when Graeme was a teenager, but they were all back in Dunedin by the time Graeme commenced his studies, training to be a dentist at the Otago Dental School. Dad's father also died suddenly, about this time. Dad had an introduction to rural life when he worked on farms during university summer holidays. He famously enjoyed his time out at Jim McCaw's (Richie McCaw's (former All Black) grandad's) property in the Hakataramea Valley. In his student days Dad also got a taste of tramping, when he walked the Milford Track (in sandshoes) with his friend John Maunder, and they went on to cross over the Routeburn-Caples-Greenstone to Queenstown. On graduating, Graeme took up a position at Wellington Hospital as a live-in dental surgeon, arriving on 26 January 1954.

Early days with the Hutt Valley Tramping Club: late 1950s - early 1960s

Tramping



Heading for the hills

Membership records show Graeme joined the HVTC in July 1956. He would have been 26 years old. Mum joined almost 3 years later, in April 1959, making her a member at age 22. Dad must have introduced her to the club.

I think the long transalpine
Christmas trips in the Southern Alps
were highlights for my father. He
used to happily name-drop the
various river valleys and passes he
had tramped through, as we drove
down the South Island on family
holidays. These trips would have
been a bit more challenging than
today, with the heavier gear, such as
woolen thermals, oil skin jackets,
canvas tents and external framed
canvas packs.



He must have explored a bit in the Tararuas. On a clear day he would point out HVTC's Powell Hut from the Wairarapa plains, and tell us about Cedric the Ghost, who spooked visiting trampers. He knew about Baines Hut in the Orongorongos. That club hut, now gone, was a place we were to revisit time and again, as a family.

Then there was Ruapehu:

'In 1960 Graeme and I were in a group of 6 HVTC who put up 2 tents at the head of the Whangaehu Glacier, near Cathedral Rocks on Ruapehu. A good storm arrived in the night and it was found Graeme was on the windward side of our tent and where he provided a good barrier to blown snow encroaching on the tent. He did this without a word of complaint. I was trip leader and appreciated his support in difficult conditions. The camp was successfully evacuated in the morning and we hurriedly escaped down the eastern slopes of the mountain.' Phil Rundle, 2021

Margaret had at least one HVTC trip to the South Island that I know of. This might have been her first time across Cook Strait.

'I have fond memories of a wonderful 1960/61Travers Sabine trip with Margaret who we called Margo back then. It seemed to be fine every day and the trip was a lot of fun. Both Margo and I loved splashing around in the Travers pools. Margo had made herself a cotton sunsuit (or was it a playsuit?) with a tie neck and elastic around the waist and legs. She gave me the pattern for it and I made one also. I do remember us both wearing them on a later trip to Waitewaewae. She was quite into fashion then. Another trip with Margo was up the Waiorongomai. There were also weekend ski trips to Ruapehu with Margo and Graeme'. Sandra Pearce, 2023.

Skiing

My parents started skiing with the club. Like tramping, skiing was also a bit rougher back then. Skis were wooden, poles of bamboo, boots were leather lace-ups. The club hut was small, with a coal range Mum enjoyed cooking on. Getting up to Ruapehu took more effort.

'Club ski trips in the 1950's travelled in furniture vans with members sprawled out on or in sleeping bags with some vans

having a second floor. Our trips started in Lower Hutt, food was collected from Ted Howicks' digs and then went to Wellington Railway Station for more passengers (I guess Graeme and Margaret would have joined there, FM). The reverse happened Sunday afternoon and it was long, 5 hours or so, as the road between National Park and Ohakune then Waiouru to

Taihape and the Mangawekas had not been upgraded.' Phil Rundle 2021.

A write-up of the club ski sports in the August 1961 Hills and Valleys (included with this article) shows both Margaret and Graeme getting placings to be proud of. It is no wonder they chose to go skiing at Coronet Peak for their honeymoon, the following winter, 1962. Like tramping, skiing was to become a family passion!

Family times, mid 1960s and 1970s

My parents had three girls in the 1960s: Jane, Felicity (myself) and Charlotte. By the time we arrived, Dad and Mum had already bonded with many of the club members of their generation, and they were to remain life-long friends. As a family, we joined in on many club activities, and got to know the families of all the old friends. We had memorable times on family day trips, club picnics and anniversaries, overnighting at Baines Hut, and ski weeks at what had by then grown to become the two-storey club lodge on Mt Ruapehu. We also had our own trips and holidays with other club families. And whenever there was a tradesperson needed at home, Dad would call up a friend from the HVTC.

'From the 1970s onwards I remember The Maxwells (Maxwellingtons) would do a roadie in Bluie ford falcon wagon, down the South Island to Glenorchy and Wanaka and we would enjoy days skiing together up Treble Cone, especially enjoying the TC Keas antics. Often Brian would skin up the hill.

We would go on hikes together up the local tracks into the hills, to Aspiring hut, Rob Roy Glacier, & bbq fires on the beach a favourite spot of ours was at Glendhu. Graeme and Brian would be in continual hysterics, I recall lots of laughter, stories of old times, trips in the hills. These days were always followed by dinners together by the fire at home. Then the musical instruments would appear. It really was a favourite, happy time of year and we looked forward to their visits in August each year.' Independence again! 1980s onwards



Around the Pencarrow Coast

Mum had long given up dental nursing. She had been learning pottery with the Point Howard Art Society, and went on to take School Certificate and University Entrance art. She had guite a few connections with arty people, so for a while set up her small shop 'Maggie's Arts and Crafts' in downtown Wellington, initially in the room next to Dad's dental surgery in Manners Street. She found time for music, learning the flute and playing in the Hutt Valley Community Orchestra, with Dad playing violin. Many hours were spent working in the large garden at their home in Lowry Bay, and later at the small property she purchased in Wanaka. Mum was content on pursuing her outdoor activities mainly with family. She carried on with day walks and skiing, and

also got herself a mountain bike. She did join the odd club outing and really enjoyed going along with Dad to the Wednesday club nights.

Dad had been keeping fit working in the garden, playing tennis, swimming, and walking in the local Eastbourne hills. He kept up his involvement in community groups. Previously the chairperson of the Muritai Home and School Committee, as we moved on to high school, he got involved in the East Harbour Environmental Association, and the Eastbourne Forest Rangers. Seeing his two oldest girls going off tramping independently, he realised it was his time to get back out there. Of course, this is the phase of his tramping life that I remember first hand, and I was with him on some of these trips.

He really looked forward to these adventures, being a chance to get away into beautiful places and leave the routine of everyday life behind. He enjoyed the company of the groups, always keen to share a story and a laugh.

'Graeme always had all-the-time-in-the-world to stop and swap long stories and to reminisce with great, and cheeky, good humour.' Murray Presland 2021


